



HEERF I, II, III Fund Report Report #7 – July 10, 2021

Pima Community College signed and submitted to the Department of Education the Certification and Agreement on April 10, 2020, to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students. Pima Community College received notice of allocation of HEERF funds for providing emergency financial aid grants to students on April 20, 2020.

Pima Community College signed and submitted to the Department of Education the Certification and Agreement for the Institutional Portion of the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund on April 23, 2020.

Pima Community College signed and submitted to the Department of Education the Certification and Agreement for Minority Serving Institution of the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund on May 5, 2020.

As part of the requirements of receiving funds under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act, the college is required to provide periodic reporting. The first report is due within 30 days of the notice of allocation. Subsequent updates related to this provision are due every 45 days thereafter.

Reporting requirements include:

1. An acknowledgement that the institution signed and returned to the Department the Certification and Agreement and the assurance that the institution has used, or intends to use, no less than 50 percent of the funds received under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act to provide Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students.

Pima Community College submitted the Certification and Agreement form on April 10, 2020, documenting the college's assurance that the college would be using no less than 50% of the CARES Act funding for Emergency Financial Aid Grants to students. The college received a notification that the grant was awarded and funds were available on April 20, 2020.

2. The total amount of funds that the institution will receive or has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement [for] Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.
 - a) Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES, also known as HEERF 1). Pima Community College received \$4,994,525 to distribute to students, April 2020. Pima Community College also determined that \$1,500,000 of the institutional portion received to be distributed to students.
 - b) Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA, also known as HEERF 2). Pima Community College received \$4,994,525 to distribute to students, March 2021.
 - c) American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA, also known as HEERF 3). Pima Community College received \$19,906,024 to distribute to students, June 2021.

- The total amount of Emergency Financial Aid Grants distributed to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act as of the date of submission (i.e., as of the 30-day Report and every 45 days thereafter).

Pima Community College estimates the total number of students eligible to participate in the Emergency Financial Aid Grants program to be more than 18,000 students.

- The total number of students who have received an Emergency Financial Aid Grant to students under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act.

As stated in item #3, the total number of students that have received Emergency Financial Aid Grants is 19,425 as of today's report.

- The method(s) used by the institution to determine which students receive Emergency Financial Aid Grants and how much they would receive under Section 18004(a)(1) of the CARES Act.

The procedures used to identify students who may be eligible for the Emergency Financial Aid Grants included:

- 1) Students enrolled on March 13, 2020, or after.
 - 2) Students that have completed a Free Application for Federal Financial Aid (FAFSA) or are eligible to complete the FAFSA. *This is not a requirement for the distribution of ARPA (HEERF 3).*
 - 3) Students that meet the criteria specified in Section 484 of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended
 - 4) If students otherwise met requirements, they were automatically selected and distributed funds in the tiered award amount based on enrollment level.
- Any instructions, directions, or guidance provided by the institution to students concerning the Emergency Financial Aid Grants.

Notice of the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund was sent through a variety of methods, including emails sent directly to students and placement on the college's portal and web site, social media posts, and the local newspapers. <https://www.pima.edu/news/coronavirus/resources-student.html>

Institutional and MSI Portion

The total amount of funds that the institution has received from the Department pursuant to the institution's Certification and Agreement [for] Emergency Financial Aid Grants to Students.

- a) Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act (CARES, also known as HEERF 1). Pima Community College received \$4,994,524 for the Institutional portion and \$640,155.00 for the MSI portion, April 2020. Pima Community College determined that \$1,500,000 of the institutional portion received to be distributed to students.
- b) Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA, also known as HEERF 2). Pima Community College received \$17,602,767 for the Institutional portion and \$1,242,857 for the MSI portion, March 2021.
- c) American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA, also known as HEERF 3). Pima Community College received \$18,783,571 for the Institutional portion, June 2021.

Technological Hardware and Internet Resources

As stated by the Department of Education funds outlined in the Institutional portion of the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund may be used to defray expenses associated with coronavirus (including lost revenue, reimbursement for expenses already incurred, technology costs associated with transition to distance education, faculty and staff trainings, and payroll), and to carry out student support activities authorized by the HEA that address needs related to coronavirus. Institutional funds may be used to support the transition to virtual activities, purchase PPE or support other innovative learning methods that would allow an institution to engage students in support activities authorized by the HEA. Indirect Costs may be charged only to the Institutional portions of the HEERF II and III funding.

Pima Community College purchased laptops, tablet devices and hotspots for distribution to students along with miscellaneous software and additional technology to support student learning in a virtual or hybrid modality. Students are able to access information and directions to checkout and receive laptops, tablets and hotspot devices by logging onto their MyPima and select the Students tab > Student Resources.

Student Loan Default Aversion (MSI Allocation)

The College has designated funds to contract a Financial Competency and Loan Default Aversion Provider. The provider will provide financial literacy education and assistance. The services to PCC students will include free financial education, one-on-one repayment information, and budgeting information. This will also allow PCC to provide loan repayment information earlier in the borrowing/repayment cycle, mitigate the loan default risk to PCC and reduce the number of students in default by 5% each year.
